Founded in 1970, Buckelew Programs is the North Bay's largest and most comprehensive nonprofit provider of mental health and substance use services.

We provide direct support to over 3,000 individuals annually across Marin, Sonoma and Napa counties through our five core areas of service: Counseling, Recovery and Substance Use Treatment, Service Navigation, Supported Housing and Suicide Prevention.

Additionally, Buckelew's Suicide Prevention Call Center, part of the 988 network, responds to over 21,000 calls from Marin, Sonoma, Lake and Mendocino counties. Buckelew's outreach teams connect with tens of thousands more in the North Bay through education, awareness and training activities.

Breaking Barriers

Elsa Rubenstein's path to becoming a bilingual therapist for Buckelew Programs is rooted in her personal experiences of trauma and resilience. Born in war-torn El Salvador, she was just 13 when her family fled the violence of civil war for the United States. A traumatic event shaped their escape when soldiers stormed the family home, demanding money.

"Men dressed in soldier uniforms burst into our home with submachine guns. They took my father to the back of the house and grabbed my sister and me, threatening to kill our father and take us girls away if my mother didn't give them money," Elsa recalls.

The fear and uncertainty of that night, along with the challenges of adjusting to a new culture in Los Angeles, had a lasting impact that would later influence her work as a therapist.

Today, Elsa is a bilingual Associate Marriage and Family Therapist for Buckelew's counseling program, where she draws from her own experiences to support clients. Fluent in Spanish and English, she bridges cultural and language gaps, helping clients who often face barriers to accessing mental healthcare. Elsa also leads the new bilingual Mariposa support group for Spanish-speaking women experiencing postpartum challenges.

For Elsa, her work at Buckelew is about more than just counseling — it's about providing a lifeline to women who often feel invisible.

Identity Shift



Taylor's life changed when he decided to leave his old identity behind. Born Anthony Taylor, he grew up answering to Anthony and Tony. But neither felt right after he decided to turn his life around.

"Anthony and Tony were the guys using drugs, crashing cars, going to jail," he explains. "When I got sober seven years ago, I decided to go by Taylor. Taylor's the guy doing the right thing, the guy you can depend on."

Taylor's journey began in Sedalia, Missouri, where racial segregation, inequality, fear and anger shaped his early life. He began smoking weed and drinking alcohol at age 12. By 19, Taylor moved to the Bay Area, where his substance abuse escalated to crack and meth.

A near-fatal car crash fueled by meth was Taylor's turning point. He called Buckelew's Helen Vine Recovery Center and secured his spot. A five-day detox turned into a 120-day stay that gave him the structure and support to rebuild his life.

Today, Taylor works in catering, volunteers at Helen Vine, and remains dedicated to his new life.

Buckelew Programs Recovery Services help individuals with alcohol and substance use challenges begin and succeed in their recovery journey. Sober-living residences are supportive programs where clients who complete detox and treatment continue developing life skills for recovery and successful transition into the community.

Recovery to Renewal

"I arrived at Athena House having just been sentenced by a judge to six months of treatment. My only possessions were the filthy clothes on my back. My yellow, translucent body was riddled with track marks and scars. At 25 years old, I had walked thousands of miles of life, but none in the right direction.

It was not the first rehab I had arrived at in this way, but this time was different. The staff spoke genuinely and honestly about their experiences, they spent extra time with me and made themselves available as I tried to unravel and piece together years of using. The emotional roller coaster that comes with recovery was met with grace, tolerance and understanding.

I have celebrated seven years of continued freedom and evolving perspective. During that time, I achieved something I once only dreamed about but never thought was possible. I completed nursing school and became a registered nurse.

To say Athena House saved my life doesn't feel big enough. My time there marked the beginning of a changed trajectory for the rest of my life."

Athena House and Hope Village include a licensed residential treatment program and sober living residences for women and nonbinary people and their children on a shared, newly-renovated campus in Sonoma County (see Donor Impact page 20).

These programs are part of Bucklew's comprehensive continuum of care. Women progress from intensive intervention to greater independence, with a reduced level of care, as needed.

Athena House alumnae play an active and vital role in the program's strong and lasting support network.

Champion for Change

Greg's journey from addiction to recovery began with a tough adolescence and a brief stint in jail. Changing course, he graduated from law school and launched a skyrocketing career. The pressure of sustaining his achievements led Greg to use harder drugs. Eventually he hit rock bottom and was admitted to Buckelew's Helen Vine Recovery Center, where he took big steps towards sobriety.

Now, more than six years sober, Greg has become an advocate for those on their own recovery journey. Through his extensive volunteer work and active role in creating supportive networks, Greg's story is no longer about overcoming addiction; it's about building a life of purpose through service to others. Greg's journey is a powerful testament to what is possible when the right support is available at the right time.

Helen Vine Recovery Center (HVRC) has been a cornerstone of recovery in Marin County since 1999, providing support to more than 24,000 individuals on their path to overcoming drug and alcohol addictions. HVRC is a licensed, non-medical, co-ed residential program offering withdrawal management and residential substance use treatment, with specialized support for those experiencing co-occurring psychiatric diagnoses.

In addition to the recovery center, Buckelew Programs operates three **Helen Vine Marin Recovery Homes**, which provide sober living residences for individuals continuing their journey toward lasting recovery.

Circle of Care

Brenda received vital support from FSC to help her daughter, and family, through a challenging time.

When Brenda's daughter Emma* began exhibiting dangerous behaviors, Brenda was overwhelmed. As Emma's condition deteriorated, Brenda turned to the inRESPONSE Mental Health Support Team, who connected her with Nicole Natividad, Buckelew Family Service Coordination (FSC) System Navigator.

"Nicole is like an angel," says Brenda.

With Nicole's guidance, Brenda navigated the complex system of care for Emma, eventually helping her receive treatment. The family was also connected with services to help manage the impacts of this chaotic experience. Brenda credits Buckelew and FSC for helping her family through the most challenging year of their lives.

**Name changed for privacy*

Buckelew Program's Service Navigation connects individuals experiencing mental health challenges, and their advocates, with essential resources tailored to their unique needs. Often, untreated mental health needs or substance use impacts the entire support network surrounding an individual. Our Service Navigation programs provide education, guidance and connection to life-saving services. This fiscal year, more than **650 individuals** received this critical support.

Family Service Coordination (FSC) in Sonoma County supports families, allies and caregivers of both adults and youth facing a range of behavioral health challenges. FSC offers education on mental health and collaborates with support networks to create wraparound care plans that foster recovery and well-being.

Maternidad y Esperanza provides bilingual behavioral health and perinatal support services for Latina mothers dealing with postpartum depression and trauma. The program connects low-income mothers and their children (ages 0-3) to critical local resources.

inRESPONSE Mental Health Support Team is a collaborative of the Santa Rosa Police Department and led by Buckelew Programs. The mobile team, which includes a licensed clinician, paramedic, and homeless outreach specialist, takes a mental-health-first approach, diverting calls from police and hospitals. InRESPONSE works in collaboration with FSC, providing follow-up care and linking individuals to vital community services.

More than **9,000** FSC outreach activities
provided to the community this fiscal year.

Finding Friendship

Ida and Tansy* didn't set out to become friends, let alone a crucial part of each other's healing journey. But through their shared experience living in Buckelew's Residential Support Services the pair have formed an unexpected bond that forever changed both of their lives.

Ida, who has a paranoid schizophrenia diagnosis, moved to the residence in 2014. After cataracts worsened her condition in 2021, she isolated herself for three years. Tansy arrived in 2024 and has a diagnosis of schizophrenia and bipolar disorder. Initially, the two clashed. With staff support, Tansy became more settled and began encouraging Ida to engage with life again.

In June, Ida and Tansy began taking daily walks together, transforming their once tense relationship into one of mutual care. Their story highlights the strength of human connection and the transformative power of supportive housing.

Central to our approach is the continuum of care we provide, ensuring clients are supported at every stage — from crisis intervention to recovery and long-term stability. Our flexible service model adapts to the unique needs of each individual, offering everything from intensive care to more independent living with minimal assistance.

This continuum empowers clients to rebuild their lives with the necessary level of care at every step.



Reaching Out

When Buckelew first approached The Linskog Foundation in 2022 about supporting our Suicide Prevention Outreach program, the 988 Lifeline network was already poised to

launch. This three-digit hotline would soon make a lifesaving impact. But only if those who needed the resource were aware of its existence. With suicide rates rising, especially among youth, BIPOC, and LGBTQ+ communities, spreading awareness of this lifesaving resource was essential.

The foundation responded with a generous multi-year commitment, helping expand the reach of the Suicide Prevention Outreach program. In fiscal year 2024, over 6,500 people were connected to life-changing resources.

“As community workers, we can make a difference,” says Mario Castillo, a community outreach and education coordinator who recently joined Buckelew’s growing Suicide Prevention Outreach team. “To think I can bring that much needed component — bicultural services — gives me so much hope and pleasure.”

Buckelew’s partnership with The Linskog Foundation is proof that when communities come together, hope and help are always within reach.

Bucklew's Suicide Prevention Program provides outreach, education and peer-to-peer support for those impacted by suicide loss. We operate one of California's 12 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline Call Centers, part of the national 988 network. Our 24/7 call center responds to calls from Marin, Sonoma, Lake and Mendocino counties, offering free and confidential services to anyone experiencing any level of distress.

By calling or texting 988, individuals are connected with highly trained counselors who provide compassionate support, active listening and referrals to life-saving resources, including Buckelew's own counseling and substance use treatment programs.

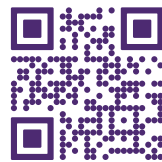


Ride of a Lifetime

Jacob Swartz, a dedicated suicide hotline volunteer for Buckelew Programs, embarked on a bold mission this summer: raising funds for Buckelew by cycling 209 miles from Seattle to Portland. What began as a solo ride quickly became a family affair when one sister, Alexa, joined the ride and another, Cayli, supported their endeavor. They rode in honor of their father, Brian, who was diagnosed with brain cancer in July.

This grueling 12-hour ride in the Kaiser Permanente Seattle to Portland Bicycle Classic raised awareness, and nearly \$22,000, for Buckelew.

Tattoo for Buckelew has grown from a personal tribute started by Nick Rodin, owner of Petaluma Tattoo, into a movement highlighting suicide prevention. This year brought together nearly 40 artists from across the U.S., a host of local vendors, and three different parlors: Petaluma Tattoo, Faith Tattoo, and Hidden Coast Tattoo. Together, they raised nearly \$32,000 for Buckelew's Suicide Prevention Program. We are incredibly grateful for their generous support.

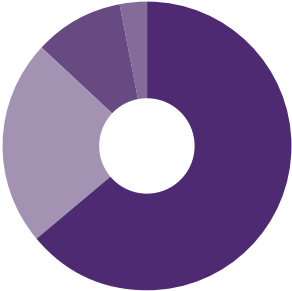

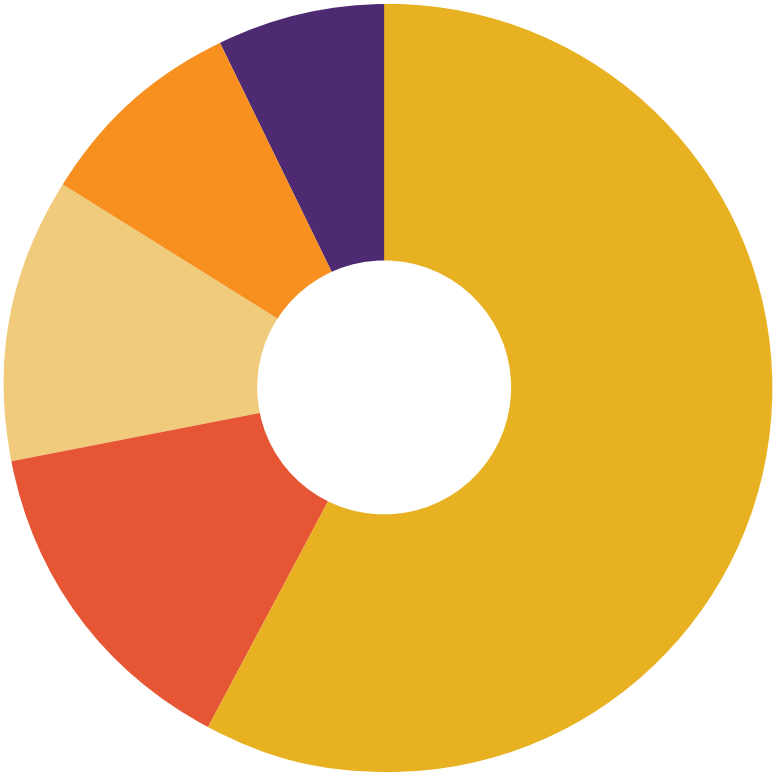

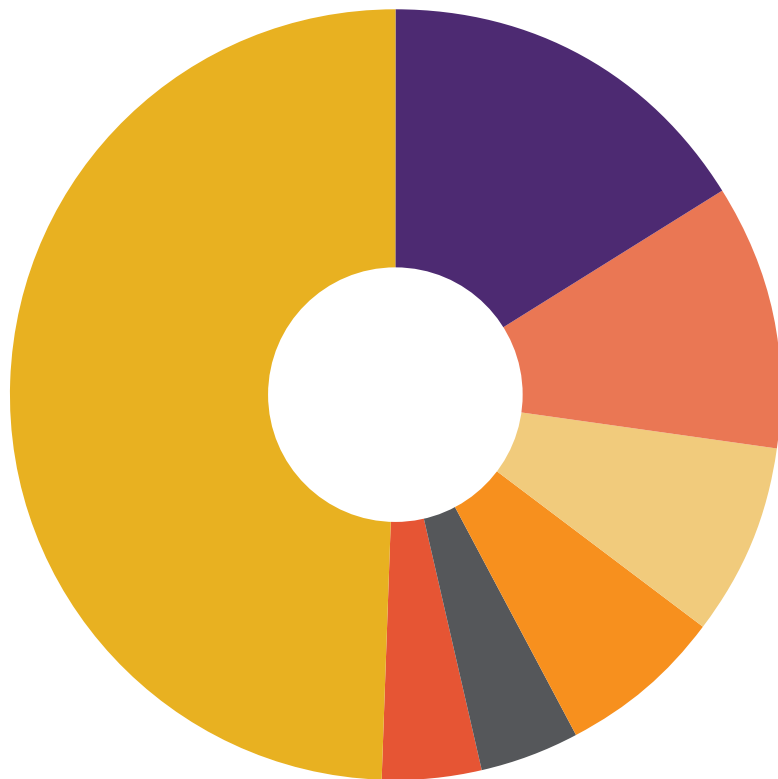
