In addition, Buckelew responds to over 12,000 callers to our accredited Suicide Prevention Hotline from Marin, Sonoma, Lake and Mendocino counties that is part of the new 988 national network.

JD Schramm joined the Buckelew Board of Directors in 2022 because its mental health care mission resonated deeply with him. JD is a suicide attempt survivor.

On June 11, 2003, JD's growing debt, a third DUI, and a near-lifetime of addiction to alcohol and drugs closed in and stole his hope. JD climbed the Manhattan Bridge and leaped into the murky waters below.

JD miraculously survived his punishing plunge into the East River, which left him physically shattered but also put him on his journey to recovery. Today, JD is a passionate advocate for mental health services and breaking the silence surrounding suicide. He's spoken at TED, volunteers as a Crisis Text Line counselor, and is writing a book about his journey. While JD dedicates his talents as a writer and speaker to mental health awareness advocacy, he also clarifies that his suicide attempt doesn't define him.

Buckelew Programs Suicide Prevention Program

operates one of California's 13 Suicide and Crisis Helpline call centers. In 2022. The 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline selected our accredited hotline to participate in their national launch. By calling or texting 988, callers reach extensively trained counselors who listen, provide support and refer them to lifesaving interventions, including Buckelew's counseling and substance use treatment programs. The center responds to a staggering 12,000 callers annually from Marin, Sonoma, Lake and Mendocino counties. The resource is free and available to anyone experiencing any level of distress just when they need it. Additionally, Buckelew provides suicide prevention outreach, education and peer-to-peer support to anyone who's lost a loved one to suicide.

Meet Eugene

What started as a court-ordered rehab stint launched a 50-year career for Eugene Hay, a certified substance use counselor at the Helen Vine Recovery Center, Buckelew's residential detox and treatment program in Marin County.

At first, I got into counseling to make up for some of the harm I did," says Eugene. "But the reality is I can't. I've come to a spiritual place, and now I keep doing this work because God has equipped me to be helpful to other people." Peer providers like Eugene play a crucial role in Buckelew's treatment and recovery programs, offering invaluable guidance by sharing their lived experiences.

Buckelew Programs Recovery Services help individuals with alcohol and substance use challenges begin and succeed in their recovery journey. The 24/7 evidence-based services feature peer providers with lived experience and help clients heal emotional trauma at the root of their substance use. Sober living residences (sober living environments), are supportive programs where clients who complete detox and treatment continue developing life skills for recovery and successful transition into the community.

Athena House (formerly Athena House and Hope Village) is a campus in Sonoma County that hosts a women's residential treatment program and sober living residences for women and their children. Operating for over 40 years, the programs came under Buckelew Programs' umbrella in 2022 after facing closure by the previous operator. Athena House alumnae are an active and supportive community network.

Helen Vine Recovery Center (HVRC) opened in 1999 and has helped guide more than 22,000 individuals with drug and alcohol addictions in their recovery. HVRC is a licensed non-medical, co-ed residential withdrawal management and substance use treatment program in Marin County serving individuals with addictions as well as co-occurring psychiatric diagnoses. In addition, Buckelew supports two Helen Vine Marin Recovery Homes sober living residences. HVRC clients are part of a large, supportive community of staff, peers and alumni dedicated to making their time in and out of treatment successful and meaningful.

Buckelew Programs Service Navigation educates and connects individuals experiencing mental health challenges and their advocates with resources to meet their unique needs. The behaviors of those experiencing untreated or undiagnosed mental illness and/or substance use affect the whole family, but caregivers might not know where to turn for help. Often, stigma prevents those in need from seeking services and leaves them feeling isolated and hopeless. Our Service Navigation shows them they're not alone and recovery is possible.

Family Service Coordination (FSC) in Sonoma County provides services, education and connection to local resources and support to family members and caregivers of adults and youth (0–18) experiencing a wide range of behavioral health challenges. FSC educates families about mental illness and how to support a loved one. Navigators work with families and the individual to create wraparound care to support recovery.

Maternidad y Esperanza offers bilingual behavioral health and support services integrated with perinatal healthcare for Latina mothers experiencing postpartum depression and/or trauma. The program's caseworkers also connect low-income mothers and their children, ages 0-3, to local resources.

Meet Yuri

Yuri watched her newborn be whisked away to Children's Hospital in Oakland. Edwin, born three weeks early, wasn't breathing right. His heartbeat was irregular. He needed surgery. In the following months. Yuri struggled to recover from her C-section, care for two other children, and commute daily from San Rafael to the hospital across the bay. Meanwhile, financial stress compounded for the family that lived payday to payday. Yuri was overwhelmed and depressed. Then she met Hilda Castillo, a parent aid caseworker with Buckelew's Maternidad y Esperanza program. With Yuri's financial and mental health crises colliding, Hilda sprang into triage mode, connecting her to mental health support and financial aid services for rent, groceries, diapers, and health care.

inRESPONSE Mental Health Support Team


was launched in 2022 by the Santa Rosa Police Department, and Buckelew plays a key role in planning and leading the first mobile team. inRESPONSE answers calls for mental health. substance use and housing crises that often come through 911 or community-line calls. The team, which rides in a van bearing a logo distinct from law enforcement, includes a licensed clinician, firefighter paramedic, and homeless outreach coordinator. With a mental-health-first approach, they bring resources to people in crisis while diverting cases from police, jails, and hospitals. The team conducts assessments and follow-ups with system navigators who connect vulnerable individuals with resources and services such as housing, therapy, medication appointments and other critical support. Buckelew's FSC staff also provide postvention wraparound services.

Meet Sabrina

Sabrina has experienced mental health and substance use challenges since her teens, but therapy "just wasn't my thing," she says. She struggled to keep healthy personal relationships and became estranged from her mother and sister. For many years, she coped by using alcohol and substances. When her father and brother died in close succession, she fell into an even darker place that left her feeling paralyzed. As she slipped into deep depression, her work suffered. Sabrina felt like she had no one to ask for help. Then she found Buckelew Programs' Counseling Services, where she learned the social-emotional skills that would turn her life around. Now she's repairing family relationships and building healthy new friendships. She earned two positive job reviews. And a promotion. Her life is on a new trajectory.



recognizes that safe housing and wraparound services are fundamental to supporting clients in their recovery. An important aspect of our supported housing programs is our continuum of care. That means we can support our clients through every step of their journey from crisis through to recovery and resilience. Through our comprehensive service model, we support individuals from intensive intervention and care to more independent living and the need for a lower level of care. Each client who comes through our doors receives care customized for their unique needs.

Parents are fierce advocates for a child who is struggling and will do whatever it takes to help them. Amy does just that. As parents of adult children who live with a serious and chronic mental illness understand. sometimes knowing what to do for their child is the challenge. Amy's daughter, Joanna, was experiencing declining health and spent years in and out of hospitals and programs but was unable to stabilize her health for any length of time or learn the skills for recovery. Most heart-wrenching for Amy was her feelings of helplessness while watching her daughter's health decline and become more vulnerable. Because Joanna was over 18, Amy was often cut out of the care team, even though as a parent and a nurse she knew her daughter's health history best. But then Joanna entered into Buckelew Supported Housing by way of Casa Rene, Buckelew's Client Choice Hospital Prevention program. Because of Buckelew, says Amy, "My daughter is going to be fine."

In 2009, Nick Rodin lost his brother and a best friend to suicide within two months. For the next 10 years, Nick's pain was so great that he couldn't talk about the tragedies. "But when I finally did start talking, I realized I felt a little better each time," Nick says. "And then I saw that many of the people I spoke to also had experienced loss or near-loss. They felt the same way I did. I started thinking we could have these conversations on a larger scale." So, he made it happen. Nick, a veteran tattoo







